AN "EGGSCITING" DAY at Nathan Hale School

hanks, in part, to assistance from the Hazardville Fire Department, students at Enfield's Nathan Hale School recently enjoyed a fun lesson in the power of teamwork and creativity in the scientific process. Students in grades one through six participated in an egg drop. The activity was initiated several years ago by 3rd-grade teacher Jan Ellis. This year, it was coordinated by several of the school's teachers and took place in May.

Each class in the school was divided into groups. Groups were then given an egg, and each group needed to provide a 12"x12" cardboard box. Students were told that their eggs would be dropped from approximately 60 feet in the air, and their mission was to find a way to protect it. They could use only five items, including the cardboard box. They were left to their own invention to determine what other



items would be most effective. The eggs were dropped from Hazardville Fire Department's aerial truck.

Even those groups whose eggs were broken enjoyed working together on this exciting project and learned a powerful lesson. Later, they also enjoyed seeing the Egg Drop on the news, thanks to WVIT-TV Channel 30's coverage of the event.

gain this spring, local residents had the opportunity to learn more about The Fire Departments of Enfield by participating in the Citizens Fire Academy. During a series of six weekly, 2 1/2-hour programs, participants learned about a variety of interesting topics, as follows:

- Fire Prevention Extinguisher Training
- Special Operations Haz Mat
- Vehicle Rescue Extrication
- Burn Trailer Live Burn
- Fire Ground Operations
- Smoke Trailer Thermal Imaging

In addition, participants had the opportunity to visit and meet the personnel at each of Enfield's six fire departments, including Enfield Station

One, Enfield Station Two, Thompsonville, North Thompsonville, Hazardville and Shaker Pines. The last session, held May 8, featured a graduation and celebratory barbeque.

This was only the second year that the Citizens Fire Academy was offered, but the goal is to make it an annual event. The program, which is geared for adults, is strictly educational; it is not intended to train participants to assist the fire department. The Academy is limited to 24 participants, and attendance at all six sessions is not required.

ummer is here... a time for backyard gatherings, campouts and toasted marshmallows. Before you light that campfire, take the time to learn the local policy on open fires. While the Hazardville Fire Department does not require fire permits for campfires, it does require local residents to follow these guidelines, as issued by the North Central District Health Department:

- The fire must be kept small and located a safe distance away from buildings, trees or other combustible material.
- Only clean, natural wood can be burned. No trash, paper, leaves or other material can be burned.
- No fire shall be started when the fire danger is rated high, as determined

by the State of Connecticut Department of Environmental Protection, or when the air pollution index is rated as unhealthful. Typically, no fire should be started on hot, humid, muggy nights or days.

- No fire shall be started when the wind speed is less than 5 mph or greater than 15 mph.
- No fire shall be started when the wind is directing the smoke towards a residential building.
- No fire shall be started when the wind is from the north or northwest.

Enjoy your campfires this summer, but remember: if your fire is deemed to be out of control or not safe for any reason, you may be asked to extinguish it.

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
